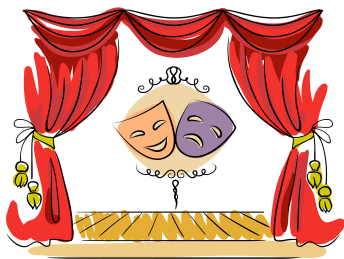


Parent-Teacher Conferences

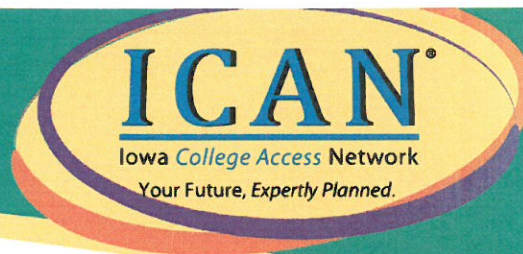

YIELD (Youth Investing Energy in Leadership Development) is a collaborative effort by Garner-Hayfield-Ventura High School and Garner Asset Project in an effort to prepare future leaders and to link local youth to the local business community.

Students will attend 14 class sessions, beginning on Sept. 14th, on topics such as professional etiquette, resume writing and job interviewing, leadership styles, public speaking, business/industry and a mentor mixer introducing students to their mentors.

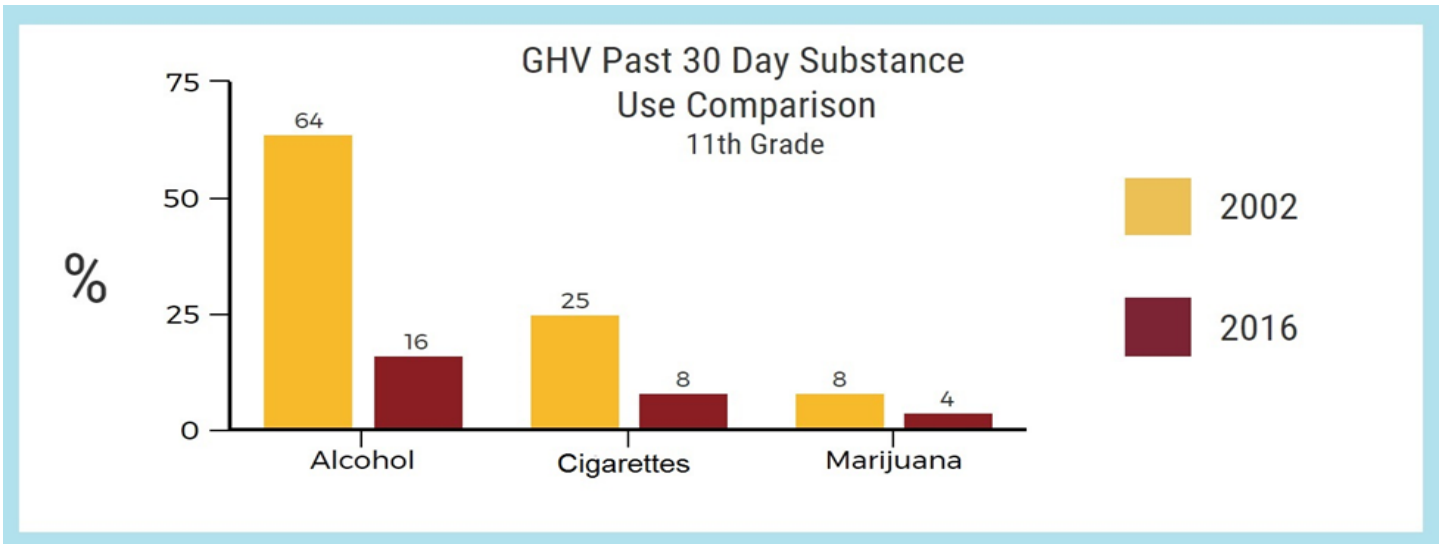

Making a difference—GAP & ASAP



Substance use among youth has been a national concern for several decades. Hancock County, through community members' efforts, has experienced significant reductions in underage substance use in the last 15 years.

How do we know?

The **Iowa Youth Survey (IYS)** [www.iowayouthsurvey.iowa.gov], is a state-wide, confidential survey administered to 6th, 8th, and 11th grade students every two years to measure the students' beliefs, attitudes, and behaviors associated with peers, school, family, and their community. This is an assessment tool communities use to develop a comprehensive prevention plan.

Garner Asset Project (GAP) has compared Garner-Hayfield-Ventura School District rates over the years:

- In 2016, only 16% of 11th grade students reported any alcohol use in the past 30 days, a significant drop from 2002 IYS when 64% of students reported any use in the past 30 days.
- The chart provided also shows reduction in cigarette use from 2002- 25% of students reporting 11th grade past 30 day cigarette use to 8% in 2016.

- Marijuana past 30 day use has declined from 8% of 11th graders reporting any use in 2002 to 4% in 2016.
- Prescription drug use (added to the IYS in 2010) when 8% of 11th graders reported any use in the last 30 days to only 1% in 2016.

These changes are encouraging and are evidence that substance use can be prevented when a community works together.

How did we do it?

Coalitions were formed, first with members at the community level and eventually at the county level in order to address these issues. Garner Asset Project (GAP) was started in 1991 and began to focus on youth substance abuse prevention in 2003 with the help of a federal Drug-Free Communities Support Grant that ended in 2015. Currently, the coalition is state funded through the Youth Substance Abuse Prevention Services Grant from Ia. Dept. Public Health.

Hancock County's county-wide coalition, **Allies for Substance Abuse Prevention (ASAP)** now holds the Drug Free Communities Support Grant. Both coalitions promote a community based approach. Members from all community sectors [Youth; Parents; Businesses; Media; Schools; Youth-

serving organizations; Law enforcement; Religious or fraternal organizations; Civic or volunteer groups; Healthcare professionals; State, and local agencies with expertise in substance misuse; Other organizations involved in reducing substance misuse (treatment providers)] have been leaders in the positive changes we have seen by supporting community ordinances and policies regarding youth substance use at the family, school, city and county levels.

What do we do now?

While this data is encouraging we cannot rest. The current national trends of opioid abuse and relaxation of marijuana laws do have local consequences.

One trend we are now seeing through the IYS is the reduction in perception of risk or harm when using substances, with the greatest drop being in our 6th grade youth. It is difficult for our youth to sort through pro-substance messaging to see how harmful substances are and the risks associated for themselves and their peers.

Thank you to GHV community members for past, present, and future partnering with GAP and ASAP in continuing efforts to give our youth tools to resist substance use and to help shape a new community norm that discourages underage substance use.

IN THE MIDST OF HEALTH CARE FIGHT, DOCUMENTARY FOCUSES ATTENTION ON OPIOID CRISIS THROUGH UNIQUE FIRST-PERSON ACCOUNT OF ADDICTION

Film Tells Gripping Tale, Challenges Stigma

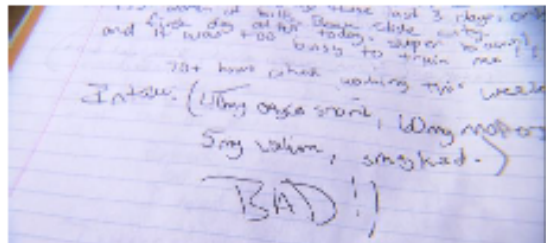
In 2016 more Americans died from overdoses than in the entire Vietnam War conflict. And yet those new casualties are rarely considered victims of disease. With the support of Rep. Ann Kuster, (D-NH), Co-Chair of the Bipartisan Heroin Task Force, the documentary film *Written Off* is challenging conventional thinking about addiction. Also an early hallmark of the AIDS crisis, stigmatizing victims of addiction has very real consequences – cutting them off from treatment, community and funding. By taking the viewer inside an individual's fight against opioids, through personal journals, *Written Off* combats stigma and humanizes the victim like the movie *Philadelphia* did for HIV/AIDS.

Edwards, whose addiction to pain medicine for a minor surgery. His grippingly honest writing reveals the secrets he tried so hard to conceal throughout a decade long struggle to escape addiction.

The film chronicles the life of Matthew opioids began at age 15, after being prescribed

"Every day, there's another story about the opioid epidemic, another overdose, another mug shot. But these stories often work to reinforce the stigma of addiction instead of humanizing it," explains filmmaker Molly Hermann, who wrote, directed and co-produced *Written Off*. "Matt didn't want to do drugs but he didn't know

how to get out. That struggle is right there in his own words, he chronicled every cc and milligram that went into body and every dollar he shelled out to get more, all as he tried desperately to get clean.” Like so many Americans, Hermann’s life was touched by addiction when her cousin Emily died of a heroin overdose at the age of 20.

Written Off recently made its Washington, D.C. debut at the Newseum in an event underwritten by the Second Genesis Foundation and featuring remarks by Rep. Ann Kuster and a panel moderated by NBC4 Anchor Wendy Rieger, featuring author, blogger and political columnist Ana Marie Cox and President of the Institute for Behavior and Health Robert DuPont, MD.

“We know this film is already making a difference – we hear from people who see it that it made them recognize the addiction of a family member for the first time. We think it can reshape the national conversation about opioids and we are running a national Impact Campaign to bring it to communities across the country,” says Co-Producer and Director of Photography Rob Lyall.

Hermann explains that “in the midst of the current healthcare debate we want to call out that one thing has markedly changed since Obamacare: the scale of this crisis – and it’s a game changer. Whichever side of the aisle, politicians need to factor this into the solution.”

Hermann and Lyall are founding partners of the award-winning production company The Biscuit Factory (<http://biscuitfactory.tv/>), based in Falls Church, Virginia. Other work includes the Emmy-nominated *Jefferson’s Secret Bible* and the Cine Special Jury Prize winning *9/11: Stories in Fragments*.
