We owe it to ourselves to do whatever we can to ensure the safety of our schools. School violence can range from bullying to gunfire. It includes violence between students as well as physical attacks against staff. There is a great deal of misinformation about



school crime and violence, so it is important for parents to guard against fear based per-It's tempting to want to blame violence on video games, movies and music or even pointing a finger at educators and school systems. But it's parents, once again, that are the front line of defense when it comes to preventing school violence.

Misconceptions:

- Schools alone can stop violence. Schools need help from parents and other organizations to instill non-violent attitudes in students.
- All schools are the same. Each school faces it's own problems and unique situations. Each school requires it's own remedies to it's problems.
- Violence isn't as prevalent in mu school district as others, so I don/t have to worry. This does not mean there is no need to take steps to ensure it does not in-



crease.

Attackers have a specific profile or personality. According to the United States Secret Service, there is no accurate or useful profile of students who engage in targeted school violence.

Notes:

School targeted violence is rarely sudden or impulsive. Prior to most incidents, other people knew about the attacker's idea beforehand. Most attackers didn't threaten their targets before the attack.

11% of teens grades 9-12 reported being in a physical fight on school property in 2009.

Most attackers are engaged in some kind of questionable before the attack behavior that caused concern or cries for help.

5.6% of teens grdes 9-12 reported carrying a weapon (gun, knoife, club) on school property.
