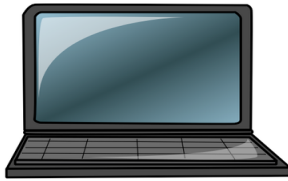

### **ChromeBook Check In for 7<sup>th</sup> - 12<sup>th</sup> Graders** by Brenda Haag

ChromeBooks assigned to our 7<sup>th</sup> – 12<sup>th</sup> grade students will be collected before the end of the school year, for summer maintenance. A student's check out sheet will be signed after his or her ChromeBook is inspected, and approved, by the GHV Technology Department. ### **CODING AT GHV ELEMENTARY** by Jennifer Kumsher

We live in a world surrounded by technology. We know that whatever field our students choose to go into as adults, their ability to succeed will increasingly depend on understanding how technology works.

During their weekly TAG class, the first through fourth graders have been learning how to code. Coding is writing the step-by-step instructions that tell a computer what to do. The programs differ at each level. First graders use a website called code.org and learn sequencing, looping, and problem solving techniques. Second and third graders use a program called Scratch Jr. This app allows students to program interactive stories and animations. Fourth graders have completed a more advanced course on code.org, and also have experimented with the basic programming involved in designing a computer game.

The students are thinking creatively and working collaboratively which are essential skills for the 21<sup>st</sup> Century.

## **NEW IMMUNIZATION REQUIREMENTS!** **(7<sup>TH</sup> & 12<sup>TH</sup> GRADERS)**

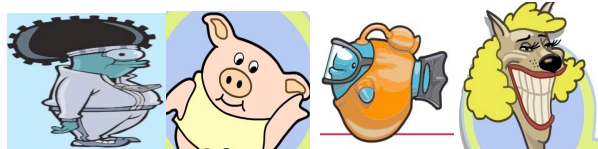
The Iowa Department of Public Health has made changes to the Iowa Immunization Law for the start of the 2017-2018 school year. This change requires that all students entering 7<sup>th</sup> grade have both a Meningococcal Immunization and a TDAP (Tetanus, Diphtheria, and Pertussis/Whooping Cough) booster before school starts this fall. All students entering 12<sup>th</sup> grade must have a Meningococcal Immunization before school starts this fall.

Pertussis (whooping cough) is a very contagious disease that causes violent coughing fits that make it hard to breathe. Meningococcal disease is a life threatening illness that is caused by bacteria that infects the brain, blood, and spinal cord. It easily spreads in crowded settings.

**All students in 7<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> grade must show proof of these immunizations being completed BEFORE the start of the school year.**

Immunizations can be given at your physician's office by appointment, or will be offered at school during spring physicals.

**SPRING PHYSICALS** – Once again, Hancock County Health Services will be teaming with GHV to bring sports physicals to the school. This is a great opportunity to have physicals completed without having to take time off from work/school. Vaccines will be offered during this time as well. Look for more information to come as we finalize dates/times.

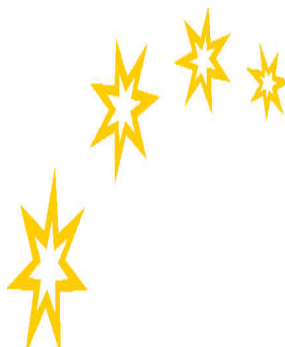


## **PHYLLIS WOIWOOD SCHOLARSHIP**

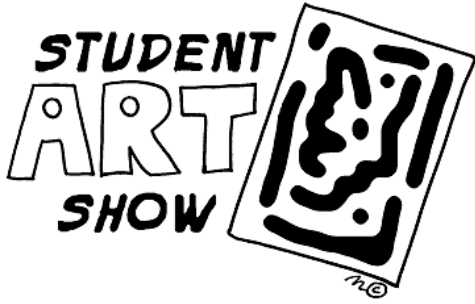
## **GRAND MARCH AND POST PROM**

Anyone planning to attend Post Prom must have the release form for themselves and their date turned in to the office by Thursday, April 13<sup>th</sup>.



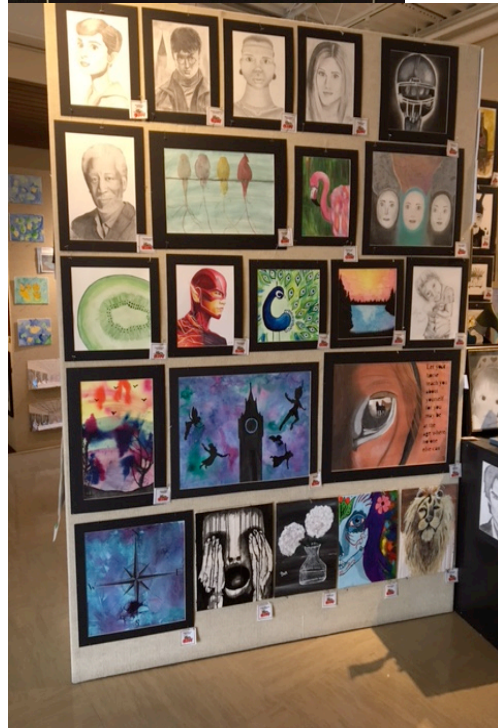
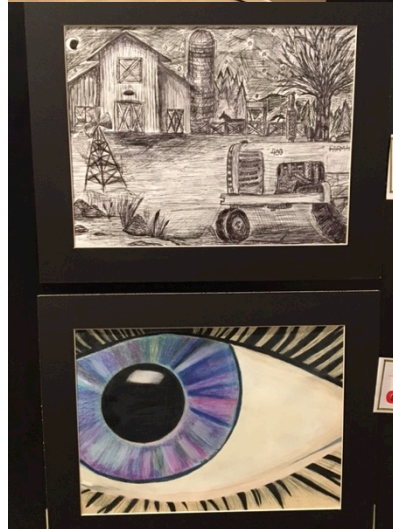


### K-12 ART & CLEAR LAKE ART SHOW

### **Talk Early, Talk Often: Parents Can Make a Difference in Teen Alcohol Use**

Dear Community Member:

This April is Alcohol Awareness Month. Founded and sponsored by the National Council on Alcoholism and Drug Dependence, Inc. (NCADD) since 1987, this year's theme is: "Talk Early, Talk Often: Parents Can Make a Difference in Teen Alcohol Use."

No other substance is more widely used and abused by America's youth than alcohol, making alcoholism and alcohol-related problems the number one public health problem in the United States.

It is important to know that parents play a significant role in preventing and reducing the incidence of underage alcohol and drug use. Fostering healthy and responsible attitudes, talking openly and honestly, encouraging supportive relationships, and showing children that their opinions and decisions matter, are all ways to help prevent the use of alcohol and drugs.

In fact, research has shown that kids who have conversations with their parents and learn a lot about

the dangers of alcohol and drug use are 50% less likely to use alcohol and drugs than those who don't have such conversations.

It can be challenging to develop the communication skills needed to talk with your children about drinking and drugs, but it will be well worth the effort you put into it, as you get to know your children a little better and help them build the coping skills they need to handle the anger, stress, peer pressure, loneliness and disappointment that are part of being an adolescent.

So, let's get started. We can't afford to wait any longer.

# Smart Choices Make Great Memories

There are two very important events coming up for Garner-Hayfield-Ventura high schoolers. The first is Prom, April 22, a night of dressing up, eating out, dancing, and having fun with friends. This event should be exciting and create wonderful memories to last a lifetime, unless drinking



or drugs are involved and then it could have a very different ending.

**Parents, talk to your kids.** Be sure you encourage your student to be responsible in their behavior and with their friends. This is a night you want to talk about with your son or daughter for years to come and not a night you remember as the time you received a call from local law enforcement about an accident or arrest.

**Students, talk to your parents.** Let them know your plans - who you will be going with, how you will be getting there, when you should be home. While planning your big night, use the tips listed to the left to make smart decisions to help keep you safe and lower stress.

## **Prom Night Safety Tips**

- ♦ Charge your **cell phone** and have it with you.
- ♦ Arrange **safe transportation** and **buckle-up!**
- ♦ **Check in** with your parents at some point during the evening *and* if there is a **change** in your plans.
- ♦ **Trust your instincts** -- if you feel uncomfortable or endangered, leave immediately.
- ♦ **Smile** for the camera: take time to **enjoy** the moment!



Graduation is the other milestone in every high schooler's life. We encourage parents and families of seniors to provide a party that does not involve drinking. Help to make this time a celebration of your student's accomplishments; put the focus on them, not the alcohol.

Parents of senior students are invited to pick up a yard sign declaring their graduation ceremony is alcohol free. Displaying this sign is one way to promote a positive message about safe and healthy celebrations for our youth.

## Set Limits & Monitor

Kids want freedom. You don't want to be a nag. But when you've discovered drug or alcohol use, all bets are off.

## Establish Rules & Consequences

Rules provide a concrete way to help kids understand what you expect of them and to learn self-control. Don't just assume they "know" you don't want them to drink or do drugs. Teens and young adults don't deal well with gray areas, so when they're offered alcohol or drugs, you don't want any confusion in their minds.

If you're a parent who feels bad about setting limits, remember that deep down, your child actually wants them. Rules mean that you care about your child and his or her safety. And consequences actually help – not hurt them. A firm consequence, such as getting grounded or having to give up a fun privilege, will remind your child what not to do in the future.

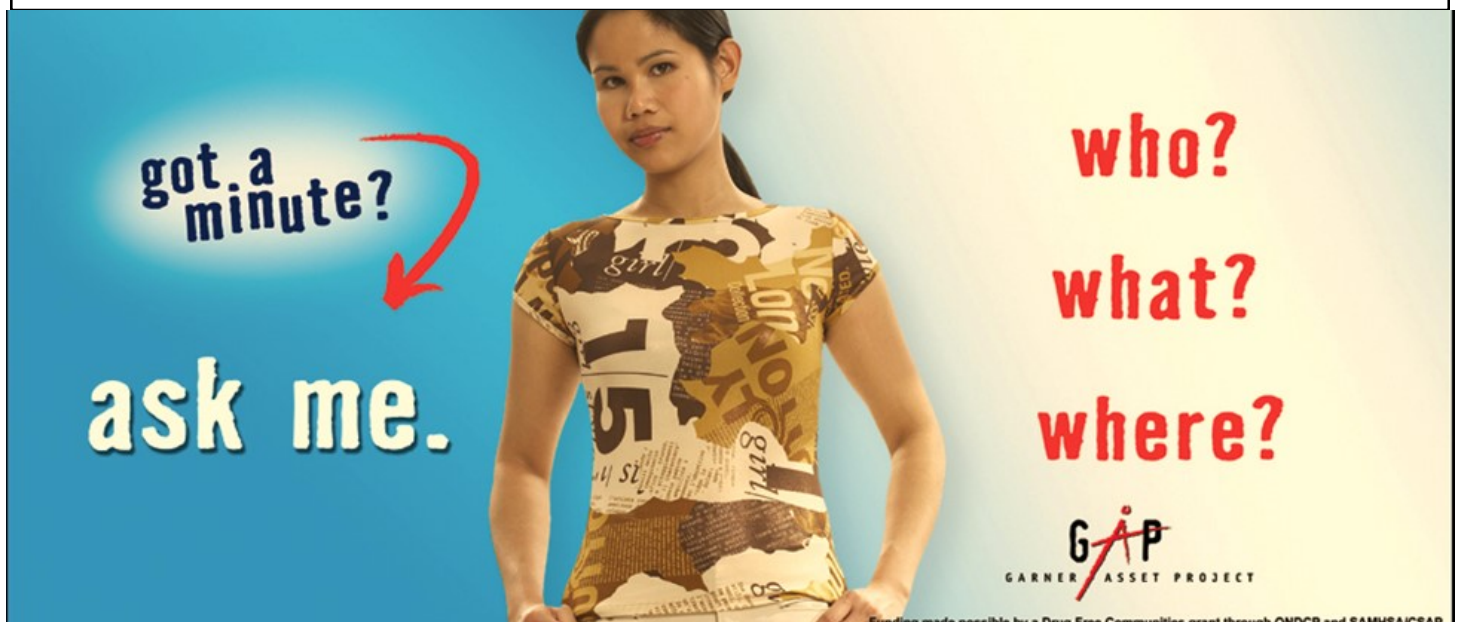
When you lay out rules and consequences, make sure you're clear – and that your child understands the limits you've set before there's opportunity to do something wrong. One great way to do this is to actually write out the things you expect from one another (being home before curfew, getting a ride home from a party if things get out of hand), and jointly sign off on them, in effect, creating a contract.

# The Value of Mentoring

At its most basic level, mentoring helps because it guarantees a young person that there is someone who cares about them. A child is not alone in dealing with day-to-day challenges.

Think back. Did you know how to study for a test or make plans for college? Do you remember wanting your first car or looking for a part-time job? Simple things that seem easy or straightforward to you now may appear to be a complete mystery to a young person.

Mentors provide their mentees with an experienced friend who is there to help in any number of situations:

## In education

- Mentors help keep students in school.
- Students who meet regularly with their mentors are 52% less likely than their peers to skip a day of school and 37% less likely to skip a class.

## With day-to-day living

- Mentors help improve a young person's self-esteem.
- Youth who meet regularly with their mentors are 46% less likely than their peers to start using illegal drugs and 27% less likely to start drinking.
- About 40% of a teenager's waking hours are spent without companionship or supervision. Mentors provide teens with a valuable place to spend free time.
- Mentors teach young people how to relate well to all kinds of people and help them strengthen communication skills.

## In the workplace

- Mentors help young people set career goals and start taking steps to realize them.
- Mentors can use their personal contacts to help young people meet industry professionals, find internships and locate job possibilities.
- Mentors introduce young people to professional resources and organizations they may not know.
- Mentors can help their mentees learn how to seek and keep jobs.

## And what do mentors receive in return?

- Increased self-esteem
- A sense of accomplishment
- Creation of networks of volunteers
- Insight into childhood, adolescence, and young adulthood
- Increased patience and improved supervisory skills
